














Who's Sky?

She needs your help, Sky.




You do not find Wise One. She finds you.

l don't wanna wake up yet. I need to talk to someone first.






















You were right, Missy. You do have a problem. I will call your parents about your getting an appointment with an optometrist.




There's a boy in my class who's got an even bigger problem than me. You need to test him too.








You are right. This is too important to wait. You go to your classroom and bring him back here. I will call your teacher to tell her what is happening.
